

# Medicaid birth control and family planning



You can get birth control and family planning services from any provider who takes Utah Medicaid or your health plan. There is not a copay for these services. You get some types of birth control in a doctor’s office. You may need a prescription from a doctor to get some birth control at a pharmacy or for over-the-counter birth control.

Type of birth control	Medicaid coverage
<b>Condoms</b>	Yes* OTC
<b>Contraceptive implants</b>	Yes
<b>Creams</b>	Yes* OTC
<b>Depo-Provera</b>	Yes, by doctor
<b>Diaphragm</b>	Yes* OTC
<b>Foams</b>	Yes* OTC
<b>IUD**</b>	Yes, by doctor
<b>Morning after pill</b>	Yes
<b>Patches</b>	Yes
<b>Pills</b>	Yes
<b>Rings</b>	Yes
<b>Sterilization (tubes tied or Vasectomy)</b>	Yes*** Consent form required
<b>Non-surgical sterilization (like Essure)</b>	Yes*** Consent form required

\*OTC means over the counter. You must have a prescription from your doctor.

\*\*An IUD is available in the hospital after childbirth or in your provider’s office.

\*\*\*Sterilization consent forms must be signed with your doctor 30 days before surgery.
