Settings that Demonstrated Compliance by July 1, 2021

On March 17, 2014, new federal Medicaid rules for Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) went into effect. The rules impact many parts of HCBS. One of the most important topics is the places where HCBS can be provided.

Because HCBS programs are offered as alternatives to nursing and intermediate care facility services, the new rules make sure that HCBS are provided in settings that are not institutional in nature. To follow this rule, states must make sure that HCBS settings are part of a larger community, people are able to have choices about their service settings, and that people are assured their rights to privacy, dignity and respect.

States must evaluate their HCBS programs to determine the level of compliance with the new rules. The setting indicated on this form had initially been identified as requiring to go through the heightened scrutiny process as part of the compliance process. They were able to demonstrate compliance with the settings criteria by July 1, 2021, so they are not required to go through the entire heightened scrutiny process, but they are required to go out for public comment.

Settings that Demonstrated Compliance by July 1, 2021

There are two programs located on the same site that are physically located separate and apart from each other. There is an Autism (disability specific) program that is located in a separate part of the building than the other day program at the same setting. Neither program has access to each other. This has a segregating effect for the individuals receiving services. The setting does not facilitate the opportunity to be integrated into the greater community to the same degree as individuals not receiving HCBS services

- Better planning in regards to activities to make them more meaningful to individuals to ensure integration into the greater community
- Individuals' reported they would like more interaction with individuals outside of the program

Remediation Plan Summary:

Danville replied that individuals are actively involved in the planning of their personal choice activities in the community. Transportation and/or short distance walks are offered to integrate and enter community settings which include grocery stores, hardware stores, restaurants, parks, rec-center, hiking, yard sales, mall, libraries, sporting goods, senior center, fishing ect. Danville encourages family involvement and natural support to help the individuals have more interaction with individuals outside of the program.

Onsite Visit Summary (6/2021):

Staff and individuals stated they were able to access the community for activities such as going to yard sales, stores, parks, to get drinks, and eat out as desired. The setting offers an opportunity to develop work skills and interests. The setting is colocated with the Danville supported employment program where people are referred to if interested in employment.

Summary:	Onsite Visit Summary (10/2019): There was no observed personal information posted in the setting. There were also no concerns reported about staff using disrespectful language towards individuals served. Setting allows for ample individual choice of activities. There is no set schedule and individuals can decide daily what they would like to do and what community activities to participate in.	

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There is an Autism (disability specific) program that is located in a separate part of the building than the other day program at the same setting. Neither program has access to each other. Individuals' are not able to move freely between the two programs. This has a segregating effect for the individuals receiving services. No other restrictions were observed or reported. Remediation Plan Summary:

The title of the Autism program (disability specific name) was changed to Danville Day Supports. The program is no longer disability specific and is based on desired level of activity. Individuals are able to choose which program to participate in and can move between the programs.

Onsite Visit Summary (6/2021):

The setting has two separate day service groups that have their own rooms at the same building. They are able to interact when they choose and can go on activities together.

The groups are separated based on desired level of activity and engagement. The DES group is slower paced and more calm. The Danville Day group is faster paced, prefering to be busy and active throughout the day. Individuals are able to choose which group they join and may switch if desired.

Overall, the setting enforces the Home and Community-Based Settings Regulation requirements.

Summary:	Overall, all segregating and institutional concerns were addressed through the remediation process and the State was able to validate that the areas were remediated through the validation visit process. Staff are trained on HCBS requirements both upon hire and ongoing. As indicated below, this setting will be reviewed through ongoing monitoring activities.
